7 Things Pet Owners Do That Drive Vets Crazy

It's a tough subject to tackle. After all, vets do plenty of annoying things, too. But this particular post is all about you — well, not you, but the "annoying yous" among you. Not that most of you deserve this, but some of you just might! So without any further hedging, let me launch into the most annoying things pet owners do.

I. Answer Their Cells

Need I say more? Is there anything more annoying and disrespectful than answering a phone call while your vet is delivering her state-of-your-pet's-health address? OK, it might be worse if you dug out your phone to initiate a call mid-exam, but only by a smidge. They're both just plain rude.

2. Bring Their Children

I dearly love children (mine mostly, but yours can also be cool), but very young or badly behaved children are an unnecessary

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liability in a veterinary environment. It's hard enough to keep pets safe much less kids. So unless your children are old enough and/or chill enough to hang out in a vet setting, they should probably stay home.

One exception: If

your pet has an emergency and you have no one to care for your kids,

you are most definitely excused. We'll understand. Call ahead and we may even assign an employee to keep tabs on them so you can concentrate on what's wrong with your pet.

3. Let Their Dogs Run Amok

This is not the dog park. *And, for the* record, retractable leads should remain in the shortest, locked position for the duration

of your visit. After watching an innocent human get taken down in the lobby by an overlong retractable line, I decided there should be a law against these in vet hospitals.

4. Carry Their Cat

I've never been able to fathom why some owners insist upon bringing their cats to the vet hospital without carriers. Some will use harnesses, which won't help them when faced with a truly motivated dog. And, honestly, I'd never blame a dog for attacking a cat in a veterinary hospital environment. After all, these cats are probably giving off cornered prey vibes that some dogs can't ignore.



Remember my post about cats in carriers? Cats are more comfortable in uncertain environments when they're enclosed.

5. Deny, Deny, Deny

It drives us crazy. These clients effectively employ us to be their experts, then they put up roadblock after roadblock: "No, my pet is not fat."

"No, my pet's teeth are not rotting." "No, he's too old for surgery." "No, her claws are not too long." It's exasperating!

I can understand why you might (and you should!) question your vet about health care issues that are important to you, but why come to the vet if you're unwilling to have an open dialogue about what your pet needs and doesn't need?

6. Refuse to Pay

It happens more often than you'd think. Pet owners agree to procedures and hospitalization — and later refuse to pay. Sometimes they say that they forgot their checkbooks. Other times they claim to have misunderstood the payment policy, even though there's a sign in almost every veterinary hospital in the United States that explains payment is expected when services are rendered. I even had a client cancel her Amex payment after we saved her anemic cat's life with a blood transfusion.

Removing a tick!

As warmer weather approaches (did it ever really leave? LOL!), here is a refresher on how to remove a tick from your pet!

Ticks are a major problem for both dogs and humans because of the dangerous diseases they carry and transmit. Even when you take precautions, you may find a tick on your dog, typically seen as a bump or swollen area with a tick burrowed just under the dog's skin.

Prompt and proper removal is important in preventing an attached tick from transmitting an infection to your dog. It can take between 24 and 48 hours for a burrowed tick to infect its host, so quick removal is critical.

step 2

If you have inspected your dog

and found a tick burrowed on your dog's skin, follow the steps below to remove the tick safely. *Note,* if the tick is too deeply burrowed into your dog's skin, or you are uncomfortable with removing the tick yourself, take your dog to a vet so it can be removed.

Learning the proper way to remove a tick is important — if the pest is removed incorrectly, this can result in the infection being "injected" into the dog's blood stream.

Incorrect removal can result in:

- The tick's mouth parts being left behind in the skin – this can result in septic abscesses and serious blood infection.
- Compression of the tick's abdomen can cause tick to regurgitate the blood meal, injecting infective agents into the blood stream of the dog.
- Puncture of the tick's body can cause tick to regurgitate the blood meal, injecting infective agents into the blood stream of the dog.
- Stress to the tick an cause tick to regurgitate the blood meal, injecting infective agents into the blood stream of the dog.

Do not use petroleum jelly, oils /butter, rubbing alcohol, paraffin, nail polish remover, liquid soap, or any liquid solutions to stimulate the tick to release its grip. Do not apply a freezing agent, or burn the tick with a cigarette, match, or lighter. All these methods may get a tick to release its grip, but they also stress the tick and thereby significantly increase the chances of it infecting your dog.

There are really only two safe ways to remove an attached tick: with fine-tipped (precision) tweezers or with a tick-removal tool

You will need the following items:

- Pair of latex or rubber gloves
- Clean pair of fine-tipped (precision) tweezers or a commercial tick remover, such as the O'Tom Tick Twister or Tick Key
- Antiseptic
- Isopropyl alcohol
- small container or zip-lock bag

Remove the tick.

Wear latex or rubber gloves while removing the tick to avoid contact with your skin. If gloves are not available, use tissue to protect your skin. Do not handle the tick with your bare hands, as you may infect yourself through breaks in your skin or through your eyes, mouth or nose.

If using tweezers:

- Gently grasp the tick (*Step 1 left*) as close to your dog's skin as possible. Try not to pinch your dog's skin. Be careful not to squeeze or squish the body of the tick.
- Pull outward in a straight, steady motion (*Step 2 left*). Do not twist or jerk the tick, as this may leave the mouth parts embedded. If parts are broken off, remove any embedded mouth parts with sterilized needle.
- Make sure the entire tick is removed.

If you're using a tick remover:

- Gently press the remover against your dog's skin near the tick.
- Slide the notch of the remover under tick.
- Continue sliding the remover until the tick is caught in the small end of the notch and is pulled free. (The tick will remain in the bowl of the remover.) As tick removers vary slightly in function from each other, be sure to read the instructions on packaging.

Sterlize the bite site. Clean the bite site on your dog's skin with antiseptic and make sure to clean your tweezers or tick remover with isopropyl alcohol. Dispose of your gloves and wash your hands, too!

Preserve the tick. Once it is removed, you will want to save the tick for testing and identification purposes, in case your dog develops symptoms of an illness.

- Drop the tick into a small container that contains isopropyl alcohol (the alcohol will quickly kill the tick). Or, put the tick in a sealed ziplock bag (preferably with preserving agent) and store it in a freezer.
- Mark the date on the container.
- If your dog begins displaying symptoms of a tick-borne illness, your veterinarian may want to identify or test the tick.

Monitor your dog. If you are unsure when your dog may have been bitten, you may want to take your dog to a vet for a check up.

Keep an eye on the bite area for infection. If your dog's skin remains irritated or infected, make an appointment with your veterinarian.

Watch your dog for symptoms of tickborne diseases. Some symptoms include arthritis or lameness that lasts for three to four days, reluctance to move, swollen joints, fever, fatigue, swollen lymph nodes, loss of appetite, and neurological problems. Read our article on Canine Lyme Disease: Symptoms, Treatment and Prevention for more information on signs of this tick-borne disease.



A natural tick deterrent for human usage – 1 part tea tree oil to 2 parts water in a spray bottle. Spray on sboes, socks, and pant cuffs.

We NEED your help! Last week Jamie Ostberg took in a new rescue 'Roxie,' a 6-year old female Papillon from a family in our community that could no longer keep her.

The day after she joined their home, 'Roxie' had an unfortunate incident in the backyard in which her right paw was degloved (the flesh from her wrist to toes was severed and pulled over her toes — similar to peeling a rubber glove off from the wrist — how it turns inside out as you pull it off) and a fracture of her metacarpal bone. Can you say OUCH!

The Ostbergs immediately took her to the emergency vet in Grapevine and were told it was a very serious situation. The skin being severed in this way detaches it from any blood supply and will likely die. Best case scenario is that in surgery they would recover enough skin to cover her paw completely and hopefully the skin revives.

The surgery went well and they were able to recover enough skin to close the wound, but now the wait begins to see if the skin will survive. If it doesn't take, the options are few: possible skin grafts which can be very susceptible to infection and takes a very long time to heal or, worst case, amputation.

Jamie picked her up the following morning and she is home and doing well. The Ostbergs are providing huge amounts of TLC and of course our hearts are heavy but optimistic. This little girl is suffering through no fault of her own and one way or another Jamie and Ron will see she gets the best care possible!

It is not like The Ostbergs to reach out like this and they would only do so in such a trying situation. This is above and beyond what PapHaven can afford to do. We have had to pay for Roxie's vet and hospital bills out of our pocket which unfortunately has set us back financially. (We would do so again gladly.) We know

there are many struggling through hard times and only ask you to give if you can. Please use this PayPal account to help defray the cost of Roxie's vet and hospital bills. Roxie is doing well. What a good dog! She has been easy to keep quiet. I bought a clear e-collar (cone) and she hasn't even tried to get it off. It makes a lot of difference if they can see! They should all be clear plastic. She is fine being in her crate as long as she can see me. I have her in a doggie stroller part of the time so she can be with all of us. I let her sack out on the couch with me, too. I just keep a close eye on her and the doggie steps by her just

in case....

Dr. Franks says the skin graft looks great. We have had the bandage changed every other day and now we don't go in until Tuesday (May 15), and the stitches come out then. Here are pictures of her right after her skin graft. The stitches on her hip are from the burn from the heating pad (bottom right). The stitches above the leg wrap are where they took the skin for the graft (*bottom left*). She gets cold with all the fur gone, so she wears these pj's at night (*bottom center*). They also keep her from stealing a quick nibble on her stitches, so she can have a short break from her cone while she is on my lap or next to me. Isn't she cute? You can tell she is finally comfortable. She gives both Ron and I and our four Paps lots of kisses now!

We first met Spike in the June 2011 issue of *The Way Home* (pg. 4), when he appeared in a picture with Chopper the Biker dog at a ball game. Since then, I have "befriended" Spike on Facebook. "If I can inspire with my story of survival and beating the odds, then I'm a happy Papillon. I never had human or dog friends before I was rescued, now I have my own Pack!! Here's how it all came to be...

My human friends call me a "little survivor." My first owner didn't like me much and would kick and shake me a lot... said I was too little and useless. I was never taken to the vet, and most of my teeth were severely infected, bleeding & falling out. It sure hurt to eat, so I was pretty skinny... about three pounds. I lost my voice back then and couldn't even bark. To this day, I rarely make any sound at all. One day, my mom heard about me and came to my rescue. I almost went to the Rainbow Bridge then, but after a few trips to the vet

I got better. I lost all of my teeth except for four, but that's ok because now I get lots of fresh chicken & turkey, no dry dog food for me!

Then about three years ago, I wasn't feeling so good. I went over to mom & dad and collapsed. When I woke up I was in the hospital. They told us I had advanced congestive heart failure, a Stage 4 heart murmur, and a collapsing trachea. Wow! Big words I didn't understand, but when mom started crying I knew something was wrong. The heart vet figured my heart got big & sick from all the years of poor treatment and decay from my old rotting teeth.

They gave me 6-8 months to live, which to me seemed like a long time. So, I was ok with it. But when I realized that mom wouldn't be going with me, well, I decided I wouldn't go either! I started taking my heart medicines and eating only

Want to impress your dog-loving friends? Here's some very interesting trivia regarding our furry loved ones!

Our breed

- pronounced PAP-ee-yawn. Papillon means butterfly in French
- The breed was thought to have originated in Spain and Italy and from there was introduced into France.
- Papillons are full of life and intelligence, and enjoy being companions. They are a big dog in a little dog's body. They can do most things a large dog can do with less upkeep, effort, or space requirements.
- Papillons prefer to be with people, but are very social and not typically known as yappy or nervous.
- Papillons are said to have been one of the favorites of Marie Antoinette.
- King Henry II allegedly spent upwards of 100,000 crowns on his papillons.
- Once a favorite pet of French and Spanish nobility.
- The breed type has remained true for more than 700 years, and this unique breed has been portrayed in works of art dating back at least that long.
- The Papillon was first recognized by the AKC in 1915 with the formation of the



Papillon Club of America. In 1999, Kirby became the first Papillon to win the prestigious "Best in Show" at the annual Westminster Kennel Club dog show. Kirby also won international success for the breed by taking the World Dog Show in Helsinki, Finland, and the Royal Invitational in Canada in 1998.

- This breed enjoys a long history that dates back to the 14th century, and were introduced to the United States around the 19th century.
- They were very popular as royal companions in the 15th-17th centuries, and at that time they were called Continental Toy Spaniels. They can be traced through paintings of the Old Masters in every country in Western Europe as far back as the 16th century.
- Papillons are considered white dogs with colored markings. The colors are black, red, lemon, sable, liver, silver, fawn, black & tan, brown, black red, black brown, red sable, and they can have a black markings, red markings, sable markings, black mask, and tan markings. The nose, eye rims, and lips should be pigmented black. All white dogs, or solid color, are disqualified.
- They do not realize their size matters to other dogs, so they will play with dogs that are much larger than they are
- Many owners will claim that their dogs are "big dogs in little dog suits."

Famous pap owners

- Marie Antoinette owned a Phalène, the drop-eared variety of papillons. All papillons were drop-eared until the 20th century.
- Madame de Pompadour and Henry III also had a Phaléne, and possessed a very strong devotion to the breed.
- Legendary screen star Lauren Bacall (*right*) never travels without her own well-behaved Papillon, Sophie.
- Singer Christina Aguilera (*left*) owns two Papillons, Chewy (*l*) and Stinky (*r*).
- Singer Justin Bieber recently acquired a Papillon named Sammy (*shown top right*).

- Tech expert Leo Laporte: Ozzy.
- George Takei, Mr. Sulu from Star Trek and official announcer of the Howard Stern Show on Sirius 100, owned a Papillon named Reine (her full name is "La Reine Blanche" — The White Queen).

Dogs in general

- A dog's heart beats between 70 and 120 times a minute, compared with a human heart which beats 70 to 80 times a minute.
- A dog's normal body temperature is 100.5 to 102.5 degrees Fahrenheit.
- An adult dog has 42 teeth.
- It is a myth that dogs are color blind! They can actually see in color, just not as vividly as humans.
- The only sweat glands a dog has are between the paw pads.
- The dog name "Fido" is from Latin and means "fidelity."
- A dog's whiskers are touch-sensitive hairs called *vibrissae*. They are found on the muzzle, above the eyes and below the jaws, and can actually sense tiny changes in air-flow.
- Eighteen muscles or more can move a dog's ear.
- The U.S. has the highest dog population in the world. France has the second highest.
- Dogs are about as smart as a two- or three-year-old child. This means they can understand about 150-200 words, including signals and hand movements with the same meaning as words.
- A puppy is born blind, deaf, and toothless.
- A puppy's natural instinct will make them chew on absolutely anything that they come into contact with (so always be sure they have something safe to nibble on).
- A puppy's eyes do not open until they are 10 to 15 days old. Vision is usually not completely developed until they are approximately four weeks old.
- Puppies should remain with their mother until they are at least eight weeks old.

During this time she will teach them not to bite and how to get along with fellow littermates.

- An American Animal Hospital Association poll showed that 33% of dog parents admit that they talk to their dogs on the phone or leave messages on an answering machine while away from home.
- Dogs' nose prints totally unique and are used to identify them, just as fingerprints are used to identify humans.
- If you notice a dog when he is fast asleep, you will see his eyes moving back and forth under the lids, as a human's eyes do. Researchers are almost certain that dogs dream.
- When a dog bays at the moon, he is following his basic instinct to call the pack together.
- 70% of pet parents sign their pet's name on greeting cards. 58% include pets in family and holiday photos.
- 39% percent of pet parents say they have more photos of their pet than of their spouse or significant other. Just 21% say they have more photos of their spouse or significant other than of their pet.
- Dogs turn in circles before lying down because of natural instinct; in the wild their wolf ancestors did this to flatten long grass into a cozy bed.
- Dogs are mentioned 14 times in the Bible.
- A mixed-breed dog will usually possess the behavioral traits of the breed they most closely resemble in appearance.
- The oldest breed of dog native to North America is the Chihuahua.
- The oldest dog lived for 29 years. He was an Australian cattle dog named Bluey, who died in 1939.
- The tallest dog is a Great Dane named Gibson in Grass Valley, CA, who stands 42.6 inches high at the shoulder, (when he stands upright on his hind legs, he's over 7 feet tall!), and weighs 170 pounds.

- According to the Guinness Book of World Records, the smallest mature dog in recorded history was a Yorkshire Terrier in Blackburn, England who, at the age of 2, was 2 1/2 inches high at its shoulder, and weighed just 4 ounces.
- Survivors of the Titanic included two dogs: a Pekingese and a Pomeranian.

Let's get crafty! Dog-Cleanup Bags

Add some fun and fashion to everyday dogcleanup bags.

Tools & Materials:

Plastic shopping bags Scissors Parchment paper Iron Metal ruler Pinking shears Size "0" grommet and grommet setter 1/2-inch loose-leaf ring Swivel-eye snap hook Biodegradable dog-waste bags

Dog-Cleanup Bags How-To:

- 1. *Cut a plastic bag* (or several plastic bags) into eight 5-by-7-inch pieces.
- 2. Stack four of the cut plastic pieces and place between two pieces of parchment paper. Make sure all layers of plastic are flat, with edges aligned. With an iron set on the wool/silk setting, iron the stack, fusing the plastic together within the parchment. Repeat with the other four plastic pieces. You may need to let the piece cool and iron again a few times to fuse completely.

3. Cut out an applique –

a shape, a letter, or a silhouette — from a plastic bag of a different color for the front of the pouch. Place the shape on the fused plastic piece that will be the front of your bag. Place a piece of parchment paper over the whole thing and press with the iron to fuse.

4. Trim both pieces down

to 4 by 6 inches. Layer the pieces on top of each other on a piece of parchment paper. Put a metal ruler along one long edge, leaving 1/8 inch of the edge exposed. Place a

piece of parchment on top and iron to create a seam along that edge, taking care not to iron the rest of the bag together. Repeat for the other long edge and the bottom of the bag.

5. Use pinking shears to cut the top of the bag, creating a decorative edge. Add a grommet to the top corner and attach a



snap hook with a loose-leaf ring. Fill with biodegradable dog-waste bags.

Resources:

All hardware and tools are available at hardware stores. Parchment paper is available at grocery stores. Biodegradable waste bags are available at pet stores.

But you've got to let us know if you can't, don't, or won't do what we say. After all, we have plenty of alternatives to offer. And there are few things more frustrating to a veterinarian than failing to treat a patient who could

Be a "Well-Educated" Owner ... How to Treat Your Dog's Broken Toe Nails

As many of you know, I research health and wellness stories when one of my own has an issue. **Enter Noel** – 11 year old deaf pap that somehow broke off the little toe nail on her right foot. Didn't realize it had happened (no yelping or crying) until a few hours later when she began to limp.

Here's what I have found:

It's not uncommon for a dog to break a toenail. It most often occurs when you trim his nails with clippers, but accidents can cause the toenail to break as well. Since the toenail is likely to bleed a lot, you need to take action right away.

You notice some blood, dog licking at a paw, limping, or yelping ... then find that ghastly torn nail. **Ouch!** The bleeding is usually stopped by the time the dog is seen at the vet's office, but the nail must still be attended to.

Every dog is different — you know your dog best, but remember that when injured, a dog will instinctively try to protect himself. This means that your dog may reflexively bite or snarl at you, not really meaning to. It is wise to use a muzzle.

Stop the bleeding. A dog's nail is going to bleed a lot when it's broken. Simply holding a bandage over it usually won't make it stop. Instead, use a coagulant to pack the wound.

It is a good idea to have shaving alum or styptic pencils at home for general first aid when a nail is accidentally cut too short, you have the necessary tools on hand to stop bleeding. Alum and styptic pencils can be purchased over the counter at drug stores in the first aid supply area. Substances that can be used in place of styptic include flour, powder, or cornstarch.

If there is active bleeding, apply gentle but firm pressure with a clean cloth to the area. A firm grasp around the entire foot works best if the dog will allow it. Holding ice on the cut surface (if the dog will allow) will also help stop bleeding.

If possible, remove any of the broken part of nail that may still be attached. This broken end often causes the dog more pain and may increase or continue the bleeding every time the torn piece is disturbed. The quickest way to do this is with a dog toenail clipper. Sometimes the piece is barely hanging on and they can be pulled off (quickly) with your hand.

Often this type of

injury leaves a bloody "stump" of tissue that would normally be safe inside the toenail housing. This is very tender and sensitive. It is advisable to have your vet take a look at this type of injury. If a large amount of toenail has been removed, most vets will bandage the area and prescribe a short course of antibiotics as prophylaxis against infection. Another method is to use an antibiotic ointment (with frequent bandage changes) on the stump for lubrication and reduced friction and pain.

Secondly, the injured nail needs to be gently washed off. Use warm water to remove any debris lodged between the nail and the toe or leg. A quick wipe with some hydrogen peroxide can't hurt either — just don't let the dog chew the area after you have put the peroxide



on the foot! It may be best to rinse the foot after applying the peroxide.

Get an over the counter antibiotic cream to place over the broken nail. A generous amount should be applied in order to prevent infection and promote healing.

Put a bandage over the area. You can secure the bandage using vet or surgical tape. The area should **not** be wrapped too tightly and cut off circulation.

Cover the bandage with a sock. The sock is used to protect the area and keep the dog from trying to get at the wound. Since the sock is not likely to stay in place on its own, you may have to use more vet tape. Baby socks work great; especially the ones with the "rubber-grippy-stuff" on the bottom.

Keep a close eye on the dog for the next few days. If the nail does not seem to heal or the dog starts limping, you should make an appointment with the vet.

Bathing your dog often is great for their coat, helps controls odor and dandruff, speeds shedding, and rids them of ticks and fleas. Bathing your dog outside is one solution, but if your dog loathes bathing, even with tepid water, this can be a serious problem. It's important to realize that dog bathing runoff can be harmful to any nearby flower beds, due to chemicals in the shampoo. A good idea is to create a pawfriendly bath station that makes this frequent activity easier and quicker for both of you.

To create a pawfriendly bath station

- choose a location where runoff won't damage your flowers. You'll also need access to a convenient hose bib or run a water line to the location to avoid grappling with long hose runs each time. Consider adding an all-in-one dog bathing system that delivers water and soap in one easy-touse unit. There is quite a range of pricing on these, so shop around for the system that works best for you.

To keep you and the dog free of mud, provide a wood floor rack or a layer of rounded gravel to let the water drain away easily. If your dog won't keep still, you may need to install a solid tie post or two with cross ties (to keep your dog still). This is also helpful for grooming.
